2. INITIAL SCREENING	
What are the intended outcomes of the function/policy/plan?	Currently no charge is levied in respect of the cost of housing support in sheltered housing. Given the Tough Times Tough Choices Agenda this requires to be addressed.
State <i>who</i> is, or may be affected by this function/policy/plan, and <i>how</i>	New tenants of sheltered housing and potentially new tenants of supported housing. No charge will be levied for existing tenants.
How have stakeholders been involved in the development of this function/policy/plan?	A Member / Officer Working Group on Charging for Council Services were involved from the outset. Initial Development Sessions on Local Housing Strategy development and a range of related strategies including the Older Persons' Housing Strategy were run during April 2011 and these link closely. This included other Council Services including Education and Recreation, Planning and Corporate

2. Sex: a man or a woman	Impact is unlikely to be significant.
Race: this includes ethnic or national groups, colour and nationality	Potentially if for instance there was a language barrier but our Accessibility Policy is specifically intended to address this. We keep service records which include records of any requirements for information in different formats and languages.

Please summarise. e.g. consultations, national surveys, performance data, complaints, service user feedback, academic/consultants' reports, benchmarking (see equalities resources on OIC information portal)	These stakeholders were then involved in the consultation once a document outlining detailed information on charging for sheltered housing had been drafted. Survey monkey was also used. The results of the consultation are outlined in the report. The consultation included existing tenants, their carers/power of attorneys etc, public members and staff. n addition it included people on the waiting list for sheltered/supported housing. The consultation included a press release and an article in Housing News. The written information and survey was available from the Council's website at www.orkney.gov.uk and was available in hard copy at the Council's offices and libraries. Housing staff were also involved. A meeting was held at the residents' lounges ahead of the consultation being launched. This involved staff, residents and their advocates etc. The quality of Housing Services is assessed through our internal procedures and also a range of Questionnaire. This includes a satisfaction survey for sheltered housing tenants. The Scottish Government has a range of research into the housing needs of older people. Its National Strategy for Older People links closely to our Older Persons' Housing Strategy. Research including Wider Planning for an Ageing Population and Reshaping Care for Older People is central to the document.

6. Age: people of different ages	Yes. Sheltered housing is available for older people.

8. Caring responsibilities	Yes but impact is unlikely to be significant. Sheltered housing is available for older people.
9. Marriage and Civil Partnership	Impact is unlikely to be significant.
10. Disability: people with disabilities (whether registered or not)	Yes. Supported housing within a sheltered housing scheme would be available for people with a disability.

3. IMPACT ASSESSMENT	
Does the analysis above identify any differential impacts which need to be addressed?	Language barriers are a possibility in relation to different ethnic groups.
	There is likely to be a greater impact on older people, people with disabilities and carers. These differential impacts are a consequence of the nature of the service in question and cannot be entirely addressed.
How could you minimise or remove any potential negative impacts?	Language barriers will be addressed by use of the Accessibility Policy.
	To minimise the negative impacts on older people, people with disabilities and carers the proposal is that the charges will only apply to new users of the service. Current service users will therefore not be affected and new users will know before they take up the service that charges will apply. Assistance will be offered in relation to applying for housing benefit.
	Although an impact has been identified for a number of groups these proposals continue to be felt to be necessary. They are part of the Council's Tough Times Tough Choices agenda and are aimed at stabilising the Council's financial situation to address reduced public sector finances and, in the longer term, ensure properly prioritised and sustainable services. The Council has a legal duty to continue to provide its core statutory services while moving onto a more secure financial footing and can no longer afford to absorb these costs and will therefore have to commence charging at a rate which will enable the continuation of the service.
