2. INITIAL SCREENING	
What are the intended outcomes of the function/policy/plan?	Currently there is a lack of demand for Rae's Close sheltered housing scheme. The intention is to use the vacant properties to provide for other people with a particular need and equip the wardens with the relevant skills accordingly.
State <i>who</i> is, or may be affected by this function/policy/plan, and <i>how</i>	Existing tenants of Rae's Close sheltered housing and potentially new tenants of supported housing. Also the wardens within Rae's Close sheltered housing. (The related consultation on charging for sheltered housing will interlink with this consultation).
How have stakeholders been involved in the development of this function/policy/plan?	A seminar was organised in June 2011 which covered Housing for Particular Needs.  Consultations on Local Housing Strategy development and a range of related strategies were run during April 2011 and these link closely. This included other

Council Services including Education and Recreation, Planning and Corporate Policy and other agencies including Orkney Health and Care, Orkney Housing Association Ltd, Sacro, Orkney CAB, Advocacy Orkney and Relationships Scotland. These stakeholders were then involved in the consultation once a document outlining detailed information on the Use of Rae's Close for Housing for Particular Needs had been drafted. Survey monkey was also used. The consultation included existing tenants, their carers/power of attorneys etc, public members and staff. In addition it included people on the waiting list for sheltered/supported housing. The consultation included a press release and an article in Housing News. The written information and survey was available from the Council's website at www.orkney.gov.uk and was available in hard copy at the Council's offices and libraries. Housing staff were also involved. A meeting was held at Rae's Close residents' lounge ahead of the consultation being launched. This involved staff, existing residents and advocates. The quality of Housing Services is assessed through our internal procedures and also a range of Questionnaires. This includes a satisfaction survey for sheltered housing tenants. 6. Age: people of different ages	Sheltered housing is available for older people but the use of Rae's Close would be broadened as regards age so this would have a positive impact as it would broaden the age critieria.

8. Caring responsibilities	There is the potential for a positive impact for people with caring responsibilities.
9. Marriage and Civil Partnership	Impact is unlikely to be significant.
10. Disability: people with disabilities (whether registered or not)	People with particular disabilities may be housed within Rae's Close resulting in a positive impact for relevant groups. The Lettings Policy in respect of Housing for Particular Needs would ensure transparency and fairness.

Does the analysis above identify any differential impacts which need to be addressed?	Language barriers are a possibility in relation to different ethnic groups.  Age and disabilities are also likely to raise issues given the nature of the policy. These should be positive.
