

Incident numbers for Orkney remain significantly low compared to incident numbers per 10,000 head of population for Scotland. Interventions made by SFRS resources at operational incidents have been within their operational capacity and had been resolved without any significant challenge. Overall there are no identified trends requiring immediate action for the reporting period.










3. Accidental Dwelling Fires




4. Accidental Dwelling Fire Casualties

There have been **0** Fire Casualties and **0** Fire Fatalities. The Year to Date statistics for both measures remain as **0**.


5. Non-Fire Casualties

Deliberate fires for Q4 in the main have presented limited damage. However the community impact can never be ruled out. SFRS had been assisted by Orkney Islands Council through the excellent work of their communications team in delivering a strong message on the dangers and impacts of deliberate fires.

Compared to the total number of fires, classified as deliberate, attended by SFRS across Scotland, Orkney represents only 0.09% of those incidents.

There are no emerging trends in relation to this statistic.


Trend by Quarter (4 years)

Incidents by Ward






Non-Domestic fires for Q4 have been low impact and caused little or no damage. Our focus on prevention has been supportive in achieving this.

Incidents by Ward


O Unwanted Fire Alarm Signals in this period

We responded to 26 False Alarm incidents with $\mathbf{0}$ classed as Unwanted Fire Alarm Signals (UFAS) during Q4 which is significantly below the average based on the previous 3-year figures.

Since the introduction of the updated UFAS Policy this is the first time that this has been achieved.

In addition to the HFSV conducted, close partnership working continues with agencies such as the Anti-Social Behaviour Intervention Team, Criminal Justice and Sensory Impairment to develop targeted interventions for those in need of support.

The SFRS continues to process Short Term Let applications as part of the auditing workload. At the time of report we have 1 property with an active enforcement plan.

12. Prevention, Protection and Preparedness

February saw the launch of our updated approach to Home Fire Safety Visits and referrals. This sees a progression towards a more people centred application of the advice given based on individual needs. The aim is to provide anyone who makes a self-referral with bespoke advice and guidance. This will allow our personnel to focus on "high risk" HFSVs.

This month our Community Safety Advocate will attend "The Good Egg" car seat fitting training. This is another positive step in providing safety advice for Orkney residents. We will work with the Road Safety Forum to determine how we build this into the Road Safety Strategy. Other Road Safety updates include the CSA's attendance at an event hosted by Transport Scotland. The 'Building Capacity in the Safe System' project is a strategic initiative spearheaded by Transport Scotland, aiming to enhance road safety practices across the country by embedding the Safe System approach among those involved in delivering road safety measures. This project is part of a broader effort to reduce road traffic injuries and fatalities by promoting a systemic and proactive approach to road safety.

Finally, our CSA has completed the updated "Fire Safety Support and Education" allowing him to progress any referrals and provide support to partner agencies that have concerns from young persons who have a fascination with fire.

This month has seen the appointment of a new Auditing Officer. They will form part of the larger auditing and enforcement team supporting safety to the business community of Orkney.

Recruitment events had been hosted at Eday and Kirkwall Fire Station. It is hoped that we can progress those showing an interest into employment with the SFRS.

Four additional Trainee Firefighters took part in the first steps towards becoming serving members within our Community Fire Stations on Hoy, Stronsay and St Margaret's Hope after completing their basic training at Kirkwall District Office.
